

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




Omani Labor Market Source: NCSI


- High concentration of Omani workers in public employment



• Female unemployment rates are significantly higher compared to their male counterparts




Labor Market Challenges








SME Ecosystem **Various sources**


 High concentration of SMEs within three main sectors or economic activity

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



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

- SME exports are dominated by manufacturing exports
 - SME manufacturing exports represent 30% of total manufactured exports
 - Other productive sectors like agricultural and fisheries fair weakly in the export portfolio

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Contribution to Employment Source: Authority for SME Development



- Approximately **445,000** are employed by the registered SMEs
- The jobs created are predominantly fulfilled by expatriate workers (80%-90%)
- Self employed represent 4.3% of total workforce employed by registered SMEs
- Average Job creation ratio 1:23 (Riyada card holders to total jobs)



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- Tech startups are driving the numbers with respect to employment
- Survival likelihood of startups is generally low and thus jobs creation may not be persistent
- Maturing Tech SMEs are yet to make impact in terms of job creation



- Most investments in tech startups are concentrated in the early seeding stage (cultivate)
- The creation of specialized Venture Capital fund has catalyzed the tech start-up scene
- Impact of these high risk investments will need to be examined closely

Are SMEs a vehicle of Employment & Economic Diversification?

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Summary

- SMEs in Oman have experienced a structural shift since 2013 where government policy has focused both financial and technical support. However, the ecosystem has not reached then maturity needed to play the desired economic role.
- Although self employment features strongly in SMEs, job creation beyond that favors expatriate workers. Therefore, local talent may not benefit directly.

- Self-employment as a driver for job creation remains a contentious policy.
- SMEs economic diversification contribution remains limited in terms of GDP Contribution. This is reflected in SMEs sectoral concentration.
- Tech startups ecosystem is still nascent. Recent developments suggest some traction however it is too early to determine the economic impact.
